- after facial surgery, use extra pillows.
- after leg surgery, raise the leg
- protect your wound. This is important to help healing and reduce scarring.
- expect some oozing or bleeding from the wound. If you see bleeding, cover it with a clean cloth or gauze. Apply constant pressure for 15 to 20 minutes. This should stop the bleeding. If it does not stop, call the Dermatology department during opening hours. Out of hours, attend your nearest A&E
- contact your GP is there is persistent pain and redness. This may mean there is the wound is infected

What to avoid

- driving on the day of your surgery
- hot food or drinks for a few hours after procedures near the lips, nose, or chin
- alcohol and smoking. Your surgeon can tell you for how long
- soaking the wound in water
- hard exercises and heavy lifting, until the stitches are removed
- flying (especially abroad) for 1 week.
 You can check this with your surgeon.
